 9.	A letter addressed to all Christians, similar to 2 Peter, and named for a relative of Jesus.
 10.	"Therefore, a bishop must be irreproachable, married only once, temperate, self-controlled, decent, hospitable, able to teach, not a drunkard, not aggressive, but gentle, not contentious, not a lover of money."
 11.	The pre-eminent epistle dealing with the structure of the church under Christ, it was written to a city in Asia Minor (Turkey).
 12.	This epistle is addressed to the person responsible for developing the church on the island of Crete.
 13.	This epistle to a seaport town in Macedonia (northern Greece) was written from Corinth, probably in the early summer of 51 C.E., in response to a report by Timothy.
 14.	This lengthy epistle to Jewish Christians was probably not written by Paul. The main theme is the priesthood and sacrifice of Jesus.
 15.	This letter begins with an address to Christian communities in the five provinces of Asia Minor. Its author was thought to be martyred at Rome during the persecution of Nero.
 16.	This letter and the one following it were both written by someone calling himself "the presbyter."
 17.	The most personal of all Paul's writings, this letter reveals much about this character and his adventures.
 18.	"For I am already being poured out like a libation, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith."
 19.	"Now the works of the flesh are obvious: immorality, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, hatred, rivalry, jealousy, outbursts of fury, acts of selfishness, dissensions, factions, occasions of envy, drinking bouts, orgies, and the like. I warn you, as I warned you before, that those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God."
 20.	The shortest letter written by Paul, it tries to persuade a slave owner to set his runaway slave, Onesimus, free so that he can help Paul preach the gospel.
