**2** The name for the first printing press to use movable type. (9)

**5** Scrolls that contained manuscripts from Hebrew Scriptures written in Hebrew and Aramaic originally discovered in Palestine. (4,3)

**7** An Egyptian term that literally means "sacred carvings." This type of writing was first used exclusively for inscriptions on the walls of tombs or temple walls. (12)

**8** The name for an ancient book that used papyrus or parchment stacked together and bound rather than strung together on a scroll. The term comes from a Latin word that means "trunk of a tree" or "block of wood." (5)

**10** A term that describes a process of "education in the faith" for young people and adults with the view of making them disciples of Jesus Christ. (10)

**11** An ancient Egyptian stone that contained writings in several different ancient languages that led to the understanding of hieroglyphics. It was discovered in 1799. (7)

**13** A Desert \_\_\_\_ is the name for Christians of about the fourth century who withdrew to the

desert to live an ascetic life of prayer, fasting, and abstinence. Their teachings had a profound impact on the theology and spirituality of the Church and the development of monasticism. (6)

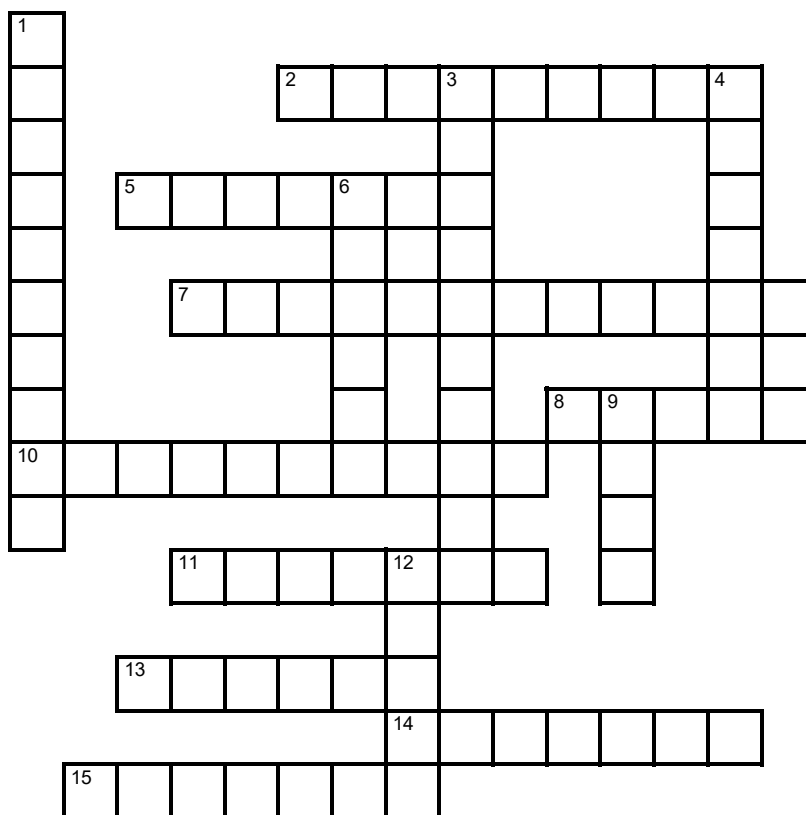
**14** Characterized by the practice of severe discipline and abstinence for religious reasons. (7)

**15** A Hebrew word that means "doorpost." Practically, it consists of a small scroll

parchment on which one of two passages is written: Deuteronomy 6:4–9 or Deuteronomy 11:13–21. The parchment is placed on the front and back doorposts of a Jewish home and on every door in the home except for the bathroom. (7)

**1** In Greek it means "five books." The term refers to the first five books of the Bible: Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and



Deuteronomy. (10)

- 3 The name for one who proclaims in word and deed the Good News of Jesus Christ. (10)
- 4 A term for one who is not Jewish. (7)
- 6 Ancient Jewish record keeper who was trained in the earliest forms of writing before literacy was widespread. (6)
- 9 The process of sharing stories and other important pieces of information by word of mouth is called \_\_\_\_ tradition. (4)
- 12 A Hebrew term that, in the broadest sense, reflects the totality of God's Revelation. However, it most commonly refers to the first five books of the Old Testament, also called the "Law" or, in Greek, the "Pentateuch." (5)
