Summary Points

- Christitells us we must love ourselves so we can love God and others.
- Healthy self-love is known as self-estremor self-appreciation. Each of us is fundamentally lovable as a child of God, made in his image, and redeemed by Christ Jesus.
- People suffer from poor self-esteem because of conditional love.
- Healthy self-love requires the practice of the virtues of humility and gratitude. Humility recognizes that God has
 given us gifts not to deny, but to use. Gratitude recognizes that God is the source of all one's gifts. We show our
 gratitude in a special way at the Eucharist ("thanksgiving"), where we receive the greatest gift of all, Jesus Christ,
 in Holy Communion.
- The Fourth Commandment promotes family values. It underscores the importance of the family as society's foundational unit. Christians recognize the family as the "domestic Church," the hearth wherein children learn about God's love and parents and children mirror the love of the Triune God.
- Children must honor their parents through respect, esteem, gratitude, and obedience of their just wishes. Adult
 children must continue to honor their parents by seeking their advice, expressing their gratitude, and supporting
 them in their declining years.
- Brothers and sisters must relate to each other with respect, patience, tolerance, fairness, and love.
- Parents must love, respect, and educate the inchildren religiously, intellectually, and socially.
- Parents must honor their children's basic right to choose their vocations and careers.
- The Rourth Commandment requires us to honor lawful officials both in the Church and the civic community. Citizers must work for the common good, promote the virtue of solidarity, unsat others as persons of dignity, and bring Christ to the market place. They must pay taxes, yote, and come to the aid of their fillow citizers in times of peril. Authorities must ensure basic human, social, and political rights and exercise their authority responsibly se a lift on loan from God for serving other.
- Neither children nor citizens should ever obey unjust, immoral orders made by parents or authorities. We must never violate God's law, no matter who tells us to.
- The Fifth Commandment forbids murder and the anger, envy, and hate that cause it. It calls on us to respect life
 from womb to tomb.
- People have the right to kill in self-defense only if it is absolutely necessary to defend their own life or if they are coming to the aid of someone for whom they are responsible.
- Strictly speaking the state has the right to inflict the death penalty as a means to protect society from he inous
 oriminals. However, today, the situations in which it should be used are practically nonexistent because government authorities have other effective means to supress crime and render criminals inoffensive.
- Jesus calls all to be peacemakers. Catholic Church teaching begins with a presumption against all war, always
 advocating other peaceful means of settling disputes. But in extraordinary situations, as with unjustaggression,
 nations have the right to self-defense following very strict guidelines.
