1.	Addressed to Paul's converts in what today is modern Turkey.			
2.	Addressed to the person in charge of developing the church on the Mediterranean island of Crete.			
3.	Paul's great letter about the Church, whose head is Christ.			
4.	The longest and most systematic of Paul's letters.			
5.	No author of this work is mentioned and it is not really a letter. Its main theme is the priesthood and sacrifice of Jesus, which fulfills the promise of the Hebrew scriptures.			
6.	Paul wrote two letters back to this Greek city, a commercial crossroads. He advised them about immorality, disunity, drunkenness at the liturgy, and eating meat sacrificed to idols.			
7.	Paul wrote from prison to this Macedonian city, which was the home of the first Christian community in Europe.			
8.	Two letters written by Paul, not to congregations of believers in Jesus, but to the shepherds (pastors) of those communities. (Pastoral letters)			
9.	The shortest Pauline epistle, only twenty-five verses long, asking a Christian slave owner to set free Onesimus, his runaway slave.			
10.	This letter was written by Paul to a city in western Asia Minor (modern day Turkey), although he had not yet visited there. Problems arose in the community from teachers who emphasized Christ's relation to the cosmos instead of to a real life of charity.			
11.	Paul wrote two letters to this seaport city in northern Greece (Macedonia). He claims that moral conduct is the expression of one's Christian faith, hope, and love.
